Biography on Patrick Miller

Patrick Miller is a Research Associate Professor in the School of Health and Human Services at the University of New Hampshire. He is a volunteer speaker for both the New Hampshire-based Carbon Coalition (www.carboncoalition.org) and the national The Climate Project (www.theclimateproject.org) which was started by Vice President Al Gore. He speaks regularly around the state to business, community, and faith based organizations about the science behind climate change, the impacts, and the solutions.

He has more than fifteen years of health care and environmental health experience. Previous to his role at UNH, he was most recently the Executive Director of The Jordan Institute in Concord, where he worked on sustainable development practices, transportation solutions, and land use practices. Prior to that he was the owner of his own consulting company, a founder and Chief Information Officer for Choicelinx Corporation, and held several senior level positions with CIGNA/Healthsource. Patrick lives with his family in a passive and active solar, EnergyStar™-certified home in Campton and serves on the boards of the NH Public Health Association and the Chocorua Lake Conservation Foundation. He is also a member of the Steering Committee for the NH Carbon Challenge program.
